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Self-Teach Computer Training Courses

MR N. M. MACLAREN

In addition to the programme of formal courses, a selection of self-paced training material is provided for loan, or in some cases purchase, from Computing Service Reception, New Museums Site, Pembroke Street. Topics for which there are self-teach materials on offer at the time of going to press are listed below, but new ones are added from time to time. As well as duplicating topics covered on the taught courses, for the benefit of those who cannot attend or who prefer this method of learning, they cover other subjects and also more advanced volumes. It is advisable to ring (3)34600 to check availability beforehand. A deposit of £50 is required for courses which are borrowed; this usually takes the form of a cheque which is returned when the material is brought back on time and in good, fully usable condition. Some courses require a specific version of the software to be installed on the computer being used; in some but not all cases Computing Service facilities may be used. As with most commercial software, there are licence restrictions which forbid copying of courseware, unless expressly permitted. There is a description for each course giving details of version, medium and topics covered on the web at www.cam. ac.uk/cs/courses/; printouts can be generated if these are not accessible.
