Professorial Pay Review 2012: Notice

23 July 2013

The Vice-Chancellor, in accordance with Annex 7 of the Second Joint Report of the Council and General Board on a New Pay and Grading Structure for Non-Clinical Staff (*Reporter*, 6002, 2004–05, p. 745), and with the assistance of an Advisory Committee comprising Sir Graeme Davies (Chairman), Professor Andrew Cliff, Professor Sir Martin Harris (President, Clare Hall), Professor Susan Iversen (Emeritus Pro-Vice-Chancellor, University of Oxford), Professor Sir John O'Reilly (Director General, Knowledge and Innovation, Department for Business, Innovation, and Skills) and Professor Sir David Wallace (Master, Churchill College), carried out an assessment of applications for a review of professorial pay received from eligible Professors. The Advisory Group were assisted by School-level Committees* which undertook the initial assessment of applications in Band 1 (the membership of those Committees is noted below). Progression within and between bands is not automatic and is based on contribution, as described in Annex 7 of the Joint Report, and assessed through a biennial review process. The Vice-Chancellor has informed all applicants of the outcome of this review.

IT infrastructure and support: establishment of Transition Advisory Group: Notice

22 July 2013

In its Notice, dated 20 May 2013, in response to remarks made in Discussion on the Joint Report of the General Board and the Council on IT infrastructure and support, the Council proposed, *inter alia*, an amendment to the Joint Report as follows:

“That the implementation group referred to in the Joint Report be established by the General Board and the Council under the leadership of a senior professor with significant experience and knowledge of academic computing and the provision of IT services. The implementation group will carry out the tasks assigned to it in the Joint Report and the other recommendations of the review panel, working closely with the two current Directors and, for a period to be agreed, with the Director of Information Services after that Director has taken up post.” (*Reporter*, 6308, 2012–13, p. 547)

The Regent House has now decided by ballot to approve the Grace that brings into effect the proposals of the Joint Report as amended by Council’s Notice referred to above (*Reporter*, 6315, 2012–13, p. 678).

Following from the amendment of the Joint Report with regard to the implementation group and in response to the concerns expressed about the implied authority of such a group from its title, the Council has agreed that the implementation group should be renamed the Transition Advisory Group. As proposed in the Notice of 20 May, its remit will be to work closely with the Directors of the University Computing Service (UCS) and of the Management Information and Services Division (MISD) but subject to the authority of the governance arrangements in place through the Information Strategy and Services Syndicate and other senior bodies until those arrangements are replaced by the proposed Information Services Committee at the date of merger of UCS and MISD (on 31 March 2014 or such later date as the Director of Information Services takes up post).

The Council has also agreed that the Group should have authority to co-opt additional members, in particular to ensure representation from the Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences.

Election of a member of the Board of Scrutiny in class (c)(i): Notice

22 July 2013

Under the provisions of Statute A, VII (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 10) an election of members of the Board of Scrutiny in class (c) is to be held in the Easter Term of each alternate year. Regulation 2 for the election of members of the Board of Scrutiny (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 117) provides that, if at an election insufficient nominations are received to fill all the places either in class (c)(i) or in class (c)(ii), the Council shall appoint as many members as may be necessary. No person having been nominated in the election for one member of the Board of Scrutiny in class (c)(i) in Easter Term 2013 (*Reporter*, 6307, 2012–13, p. 517), the Council was asked to make an appointment to that vacancy. At a meeting on 15 July 2013, the Council agreed instead to re-open nominations. The Council is therefore publishing a Grace to enable an election to be held, notwithstanding Regulation 2 (Grace 1, p. 792). If the Grace is approved, nominations will re-open and a ballot may be held in accordance with the timetable published below.

Board of Scrutiny

The Board of Scrutiny consists of:

- (a) the Proctors;
- (b) the two Pro-Proctors nominated by the Colleges;
- (c) eight members of the Regent House elected by the Regent House.

Under the provisions of Statute A, VII, 4 no person may be a member of the Board of Scrutiny who is a member of the Council, the General Board, or the Finance Committee of the Council, or who holds any of the University offices of Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, University Advocate, Deputy University Advocate, Registry, Assistant Registry, or Secretary of a School. The Statute further prohibits from membership holders of offices with primarily administrative duties designated by Ordinance: Directors and Deputy Directors in the Unified Administrative Service and Assistant Treasurers have been designated as such prohibited offices. A retiring member of the Board who has served for four or more consecutive years is not eligible to serve again as a member in class (c) until one year has elapsed after the end of her or his previous period of service.

Subject to the approval of the Grace, the Vice-Chancellor gives notice of an election of one member of the Board in class (c)(i) (a person who has been a member of the Regent House for not more than ten years on 1 October 2013), to serve for four years from 1 October 2013.

If no nominations are received in accordance with the timetable below, Regulation 2 for the election of members of the Board of Scrutiny (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 117) shall apply and the Council shall appoint a member to the vacant place.

Nomination and ballot timetable

The nomination and ballot timetable for the election is governed by Regulations 1–5 and 13 of the regulations for the Election of Members of the Council (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 114), as amended by Grace 1 of 6 March 2013 with effect from 6 November 2013.

In order to be eligible a candidate for election must be nominated on a paper sent to the Vice-Chancellor at the Old Schools so as to reach him not later than noon on Friday, 8 November. The paper must contain (a) a statement signed by two members of the Regent House, nominating the candidate for election to the Board or Nominating Committee, as appropriate, and (b) a statement signed by the candidate certifying that he or she consents to be so nominated. The candidate should also provide a *curriculum vitae* by the same date (see below).

The Vice-Chancellor would be obliged if nominations could be delivered to the Registry in the Old Schools during office hours. Envelopes should be clearly marked as Nomination papers. Nomination papers may also be faxed to 01223 332332 or scanned (showing signatures) and sent by email to registry@admin.cam.ac.uk. Nominations will be published on the Senate-House noticeboard as they are received; the complete list of nominations will be published in the *Reporter* on Wednesday, 13 November.

In accordance with the regulations governing the election, each person nominated for election is required to send to the Registry, not later than noon on Friday, 8 November, a statement of her or his *curriculum vitae*, details of which shall be published for the information of members of the Regent House. It is suggested that such a statement should be of not more than 500 words in length, and that it should cover the following points:

- The candidate's present position in the University.
- Previous posts held, whether in Cambridge or in other universities or outside the university system, with dates.
- A note of the candidate's particular interests within the field of University business and experience that he or she might bring to the Committee/Board.

If there is more than one candidate, an election will be conducted by ballot, under the Single Transferable Vote regulations. Online voting will open at 9 a.m. on Monday, 18 November and close at **5 p.m. on Monday, 2 December**. Hard-copy voting papers will be distributed not later than Thursday, 21 November to those who have opted before 6 November 2013 to continue to receive them; the last date for the return of voting papers will be 5 p.m. on Monday, 2 December. Current members of the Regent House can opt to continue to receive hard-copy voting papers by emailing their name, CRSid, and the address to which voting papers should be sent from a Cambridge email account to ballots@admin.cam.ac.uk.

By amending Regulation 7(c) of the regulations for the Hamilton Kerr Institute (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 647) so as to read:

(c) four persons nominated by the Fitzwilliam Museum Syndicate for appointment by the General Board;

Curator and Deputy Director of the Botanic Garden**With immediate effect**

The General Board have approved, on the recommendation of the Botanic Garden Syndicate, the establishment of the office of Curator and Deputy Director of the Botanic Garden, replacing the office of Superintendent. The change in title recognizes the role that the Curator and Deputy Director will have in supporting the work of the Director of the Botanic Garden. The General Board have therefore approved consequential amendments to the regulations for the Botanic Garden (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 633) as set out below.

By rescinding Regulation 9 for the Botanic Garden and replacing it with the following:

9. There shall be a University office of Curator and Deputy Director of the Botanic Garden, the holder of which shall report to the Director of the Botanic Garden. Appointments and reappointments to the office shall be made by an Appointments Committee appointed by the Botanic Garden Syndicate, provided that the Appointments Committee shall include the Director of the Botanic Garden and the Chairman of the Botanic Garden Syndicate. The duties of the Curator and Deputy Director shall be determined by the Syndicate and shall include assisting the Director in her or his duties under Regulation 6 above.

REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATIONS**Classical Tripos, Parts IA and IB**

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 292)

PART IA

With effect from 1 October 2014

The regulations for the Tripos have been amended so as to eliminate the testing of seen translation; and so as to remove Paper 5, Greek and Latin texts, in its current form. The examination shall consist of seven papers, rather than eight, and candidates will be required to offer three papers instead of four. Current Papers 1–5 have been renamed and renumbered as Papers 1–4, and current Papers 6–8 have been renumbered as Papers 5–7.

Examination of tasks in appreciation and analysis will be transferred to new Papers 1–4 in Greek and Latin language, which will require unseen translation.

All other elements currently examined at Part IA remain unchanged. As currently at Part IA, papers in Greek and Latin prose and verse composition (Papers 6 and 7) will remain optional.

The revisions will allow a greater continuity in teaching and learning to Part IB.

Regulations 13 and 14.

By placing the current regulations in square brackets, and by inserting the regulations in angular brackets so as to read:

13. The examination shall consist of seven papers, each to be set for three hours, as follows:

- Paper 1: Greek language and literature (also serves as Paper GL1 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
 Paper 2: Alternative Greek language and literature (also serves as Paper GL2 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
 Paper 3: Latin language and literature (also serves as Paper GL3 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
 Paper 4: Alternative Latin language and literature
 Paper 5: Classical questions (also serves as Paper GL5 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
 Paper 6: Greek prose and verse composition (also serves as Paper GL6 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)
 Paper 7: Latin prose and verse composition (also serves as Paper GL7 of Part IA of the Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos)

14. Every candidate shall offer either Paper 1 or Paper 2, either Paper 3 or Paper 4, and Paper 5. Paper 2 is intended for candidates who had little or no knowledge of Greek before entry to the University, and Paper 4 is intended for candidates who had little or no knowledge of Latin before doing so and who have not successfully completed the Preliminary Examination to Part IA. No candidate may offer Paper 2 and Paper 4. In addition, a candidate may offer one or both of Papers 6 and 7; the Examiners shall give credit for proficiency in these papers.

Regulation 15.

By placing the last two sentences of the current regulation in square brackets, and by inserting replacement sentences so as to read:

A mark of distinction, *G* or *L* respectively, shall be attached to the names of those candidates who, in offering either Paper 6 or Paper 7 acquit themselves with credit in that paper. A mark, *g* or *l* respectively, shall be attached to the names of those candidates who, in offering either Paper 6 or Paper 7 satisfy the Examiners in that paper.

And by inserting a footnote to each of the regulations placed in square brackets so as to read:

The regulation in angular brackets will replace the regulation in square brackets with effect from 1 October 2014.

PART IA

By placing the current supplementary regulations in square brackets, and by inserting new supplementary regulations in angular brackets so as to read:

Paper 1. Greek language and literature.

This paper will contain passages for unseen translation and seen passages for analysis and appreciation from prescribed texts.

Paper 5. Classical questions

This paper will contain questions on:

- (a) Greek and Latin literature;
- (b) Greek and Roman philosophy;
- (c) Greek and Roman history;
- (d) Greek and Roman art and archaeology;
- (e) Classical philology and linguistics.

Paper 6. Greek prose and verse composition

This paper will contain passages for translation into Greek prose and verse, with some specified passages which may be attempted by candidates for Paper 2.

Paper 7. Latin prose and verse composition

This paper will contain passages for translation into Latin prose or verse, with some specified passages which may be attempted by candidates for Paper 4.

And by inserting a footnote to the current supplementary regulations so as to read:

The supplementary regulations in angular brackets will replace the supplementary regulations in square brackets with effect from 1 October 2014.

The Faculty Board of Classics are satisfied that no candidate's preparation for the examination will be affected.

Education Tripos

Music

Candidates may offer two or three of any of the following papers:

Music analysis (paper 2 of Part IB of the Music Tripos)

Composition portfolio (Paper 5 of Part IB of the Music Tripos), which shall be submitted under conditions specified in the regulations of the Music Tripos

Any of the additional papers from Part IB of the Music Tripos announced by the Faculty Board of Music, which shall be undertaken under any conditions specified by the Faculty Board of Music when they are announced.

Dissertation (Paper 6 of Part IB of the Music Tripos) in accordance with regulation 15 of the Music Tripos.

PART II

The General Board have approved a request from the Faculty Board of Education to amend Schedule 2: subjects and papers for Section IV of Part II of the Education Tripos, in response to revisions to papers borrowed from the Historical Tripos and revisions to the English Tripos, Part II. The changes to the Schedule are as follows:

*English**English and Drama*

Candidates may offer one or two of the following papers:

A paper from a list of Part II papers of the English Tripos announced by the Faculty Board of Education at the start of the Michaelmas Term.

Paper Ed.D4 Modern drama and theatre

Paper Ed.A1 Arts and performance (written paper and submission of course-work)

A candidate may offer a dissertation in place of any of the papers above, providing that the candidate may offer only one dissertation in total. Any other dissertation shall be offered under the conditions specified in Regulation 14.

History

Candidates may offer one or two of Papers 4 – 30 of Part II of the Historical Tripos.

Modern and Medieval Languages Tripos

(*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 377)

With immediate effect

The regulations for the Tripos have been amended so as to correct typographical errors referring to papers for which credit for proficiency may be given within Regulation 15.

Regulation 15.

By replacing references to ‘papers GL9, GL10, GL20, or GL21’ in the final three sentences of the regulation with ‘Papers GL7, GL8, GL21, or GL22’ at each occurrence.

The Faculty Board of Modern and Medieval Languages are satisfied that no candidate’s preparation for the examination will be affected.

With effect from 1 October 2014

The regulations for Part IA have been amended so as to remove to remove Paper GL5, Greek or Latin texts, in its current form and to assess students taking Latin and Classical Greek in two compulsory papers (a language, and an essay paper) instead of the current three. Examination of tasks in appreciation and analysis will be transferred to papers in Greek and Latin language which will require unseen translation.

Papers GL1–GL3 have been revised, and the current Paper GL6 has been renumbered as Paper GL5. Current Papers GL7–GL8 have been renumbered as Papers GL6–GL7.

All other elements currently tested at Part IA remain unchanged. As currently at Part IA, papers in Greek and Latin prose and verse composition (Papers GL6 and GL7) will remain optional.

Regulation 15.

By placing the last three sentences of the current regulation in square brackets, and by inserting replacement sentences in angular brackets so as to read:

In determining the place in the class-list of any candidate who has offered one of Papers GL6, GL7, GL21, or GL22 in addition, the Examiners shall give credit for proficiency in these papers. A mark of distinction, *G* or *L* respectively, shall be attached to the names of those candidates who, in offering one of Papers GL6, GL7, GL21, or GL22 acquit themselves with credit in that paper. A mark, *g* or *l* respectively, shall be attached to the names of those candidates who, in offering one of Papers GL6, GL7, GL21, or GL22 satisfy the Examiners in that paper.

PART IA

Regulation 20(b).

By placing the current regulation in square brackets, and by inserting a regulation in angular brackets so as to read:

(b) In classical Greek or Latin the examination for Part IA shall consist of either Option A (in Greek only) or Option B (in either Greek or Latin) as follows:

Option A. Papers GL2 and GL5.

Option B. Papers GL1 or GL3 and GL5.

In Greek a candidate may additionally offer Paper GL.6; in Latin, Paper GL7.

And by inserting a footnote to the regulation so as to read:

The regulation in angular brackets will replace the regulation in square brackets with effect from 1 October 2014.

5. The value of the Prize shall be determined by the Managers.
6. Any unexpended income may at the discretion of the Managers be added to the capital of the Fund or accumulated for use as income in any one or more subsequent years or applied in support of the Squire Law Library.
