Admission will be by ticket only and details of the arrangements, including application for tickets, are expected to be published in the *Reporter* on 23 April 2014.

Electronic voting in ballots of the Regent House

3 February 2014

In March 2013, the Regent House approved the introduction of electronic voting in ballots of the Regent House, to take effect from 6 November 2013 (see *Reporter*, 2012–13, 6295, p. 339 and 6302, p. 434). It had been hoped that the vote on Grace 1 of 22 January 2014 (Report of the General Board on the establishment of a Stephen W. Hawking Professorship of Cosmology, *Reporter*, 6334, 2013–14, p. 293) would be the first ballot to use the online voting system, but further testing is required before the system can be considered sufficiently robust for use in a ballot. As was noted in the Report on electronic voting, the Regent House must have full confidence in the voting system used. Rather than risk a loss of confidence in the voting system, the Vice-Chancellor has taken the decision, with the support of the Council, that the vote on Grace 1 of 22 January 2014 should be conducted by postal ballot. The timetable for the ballot is unchanged (*Reporter*, 6334, 2013–14, p. 293).

A Notice will be published on the plan for the implementation of an electronic voting system in Easter Term 2014; in the meantime, ballots of the Regent House shall be conducted by postal ballot.

NOTICES BY THE GENERAL BOARD**Amendment to the composition of the Faculty Board of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies**

3 February 2014

With immediate effect

The General Board, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies, have approved amendments to Schedules I and III of the regulations for the Constitution of the Faculty Boards (*Statutes and Ordinances*, p. 590), as set out below.

By amending the entry for the Faculty Board of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies in Schedule I so that the number of members in class (d) (members co-opted by the Faculty Board) reduces by one to 2 and the number of members in class (e) increases by one to 5, and in Schedule III by adding under the representatives of cognate studies one person appointed by the Faculty Board of Modern and Medieval Languages.

REGULATIONS FOR EXAMINATIONS**Master of Advanced Study***(Statutes and Ordinances, p. 449)*

The General Board have, on the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Physics and Chemistry, approved the following changes to the Special Regulations for the Master of Advanced Study in Astrophysics, to align its marks with those in Mathematics.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS

By amending the last sentence in the subject Astrophysics so as to read:

Distinctive marks may be attached to the names of those candidates who in the opinion of the Examiners deserve special credit: the mark (*d*) being used to denote a distinguished performance and the mark (*m*) a meritorious performance.

The Faculty Board of Biology give notice, in accordance with Regulation 30 for the Natural Sciences Tripos (*Statutes and Ordinances, p. 399*), that the following combinations of Major and Minor Subjects will be offered in the Natural Sciences Tripos, Part II (Biological and Biomedical Sciences) in 2014–15.

Subject to any restrictions announced in a particular year by the Faculty Board under the provisions of Regulation 30, candidates are required to offer in the examination for Part II Biological and Biomedical Sciences of the Natural Sciences Tripos:

- (a) the examination requirements of one Major Subject;

Classical Tripos, 2014: Amendment

Further to their earlier Notice of 27 November 2013 (*Reporter*, 6327, 2013–14, p. 119), the Faculty Board of Classics give notice that, with effect from the examination to be held in 2014, the form of examination for the following paper for Part II of the Classical Tripos will now be as specified below.

Part II

Paper D4

The examination will offer a choice of about twelve essay-type questions reflecting the range of teaching in the course. Candidates will be required to answer three questions.

All other papers remain unchanged. The Faculty Board of Classics have confirmed that no student's preparation for the examination in 2014 will be adversely affected by this change.

¹ The Audit Committee have recommended the reappointment of PricewaterhouseCoopers LLP as External Auditors to the University for the current financial year.

² By Grace 1 of 13 February 2013, Regulation 13 was amended to accommodate the addition of a fourth day for General Admission. However, the amendment did not take into account changes approved by Grace 4 of 6 October 2010 to the pattern of dates of Full Term and of General Admission for the period from 2020–21 to 2029–30, in order to ensure that there was sufficient time to conduct admissions interviews. This amendment enables the dates approved in 2010 to stand (with the addition of the fourth day for General Admission) and has been circulated to Senior Tutors and Praelectors of the Colleges and the Senate-House Syndics without comment.
